#### Alpha Delta Kappa International Convention Wednesday, July 19, 2019 Opening Session

The International Chapter was introduced and the 31<sup>st</sup> International Convention was called to order by President Sue Pelchat.

During the morning session, letters of welcome from the Governor of Minnesota and the Mayor of Minneapolis were read. Superintendent of Instruction, Ed Graff, brought personal greetings.

The flags of the Nations and Provinces were posted. The choir led the members in singing the Anthem of each Nation and Province.

The Three P's of each State and the Provinces were introduced as a slide of their banner was displayed.

The morning session was run in a business-like manner, but Sue's quick wit and humor kept us relaxed and waiting in anticipation of her next remarks.

In what started as a few weeks of ministry, turned

into a life time of love and helping the children of Haiti.

Ms Young and Imagine Missions staff worked with 100 children in establishing a school for orphaned and destitute children of Haiti ten years ago. These



children needed an education, as Haiti's private schools offered education for the rich and elite. Education in Haiti is important for the people to move beyond your place in society.

Melissa realized that helping to build a proper educational foundation in Haiti was to be her life mission.

Currently, Imagine Missions School has 400 students attending school for free! The school is considered a secondary school, Kindergarten through 8th grade. Plans for a high school are in progress and with donations from A $\Delta$ K TEACH and Teach TOO altruistic projects, Imagine Missions is remodeling their existing building. They are using local Haitian residents for the construction, paying them a day's wage and giving them ownership of the school.

Imagine Missions is working on giving every child in poverty an education and with A $\Delta$ K's generous spirit, we presented Melissa with a check for \$45,000 to continue the vision she and Imagine Missions has in Haiti.

#### **Bylaw Amendments and Resolutions:**

Bylaws Amendments 1-5 were approved before breaking for lunch. After lunch the rest of the Bylaw amendments passed except for amendments #6 and #12.

Bylaw #6 dealt with Limited members to remove Limited members as a member classification for a chapter. This failed, Limited is the last resort for a member — the next step is to Omega. Unfortunately, we have over 1000 members on our International membership roles and we have no addresses for these members. Arizona has several Limited members on the state list with no forwarding address. Where are they? No one knows.

Bylaw #11 dealt with the postmark for dues and assessments. The Bylaw was changed to: "received by." However, the newly passed bylaw #11 had to be amended since Bylaw #12 Failed. Bylaw #12 will remain the same and Bylaw #11 was amended to return the wording to

"postmarked" versus "received by January 1 and May 1.

#### Resolutions:

The three resolutions passed and will go to the Executive Board for a feasibility study.

- Recognition for members who have attained 10 years of membership; membership recognition will be 10, 25, 35, 50, 60, and 70.
- Technology Committee to be established so that chapters may attend meetings virtually. i.e., teleconference/video conferencing/ web conferencing
- Current language regarding eligibility be revised since some educators did not enter education in the traditional way, i.e., Fine Arts, Vocational Trades, Medical, etc.

# Friday's Educational Symposium "Shoot for the Stars Create Your Own Constellation"

#### Marc Brackett Keynote Speaker

Marc Brackett, Ph.D., is founding director of the Yale Center for Emotional Intelligence and professor in the Child Study Center at Yale University.

Dr. Brackett feels the WHOLE child should be taken into account when dealing with school problems. He feels "the role of emotions and emotional intelligence in learning, decision making, creativity, relationship quality and mental health" is key when dealing with children and adolescents today.

He quoted Theodore Roosevelt saying, "No one cares how much you know, until they know how much you care."



Brackett is the lead developer of a program called RULER, which is a systemic, evidence-based approach to social and emotional learning. The RULER program is used in the US and around the world in Australia, China, England, Italy, Mexico and Spain. In this program, students' feelings matter, which reminds me of the basics. Love a child and watch him/her grow.



#### **Liz Huntley** — Friday's Keynote Speaker

Liz Huntley a full-time Birmingham attorney, a child advocate, a motivational speaker and published author with two daughters, a son, and a husband is often called superwoman. Most notably, she has a phenomenal life story.

Growing up in a terrifying childhood with odds against her with abuse, neglect, and drug addiction, Liz should never have become who she is today. Luckily a preschool began in the local church and her grandmother prepped her before entering the door. She feels she owes her life to teachers because she felt loved when the preschool teachers wrapped their arms around her and welcomed her.

Liz explained, "I learned if I did smart stuff, the teachers would love on me." Liz announced she was the valedictorian of her preschool class.



In first grade, her life-changing moment came on her first day of first grade when her teacher spoke the emboldening words, "Elizabeth, you're going to be the brightest student I ever have." She explained that all teachers are "gamechangers."

Birmingham attorney Liz Huntley wrote a memoir, *More Than a Bird*, that tells the story of overcoming a childhood of poverty and abuse. While living with her grandmother, she also lived with two unstable uncles. One sexually abused her and threatened to kill her if she told anyone.

Liz was ashamed of her life and intimidated by abusive relatives, but loving teachers helped her become who she is today. School helped her thrive and now she wants to help other children overcome the odds. Several  $A\Delta K$  sisters waited in line to purchase the memoir, autographed by Liz. Wow! What a wonderful life change!
