PRESIDENT'S REPORT FOR THE 2022-24 BIENNIUM



When a state president starts a journey in state leadership, she creates her goals and lists her accomplishments at her convention. My goals for 2022-2024:

- To support the Arizona Scholarship Fund and Altruistic projects
- To honor Chapter Members for their leadership and outstanding women educators
- To inspire members to advance inclusion, embrace cultural differences, impact educational excellence and world understanding
- To nurture members in networking opportunities, connections and attending Conventions and Conferences
- To empower Chapters in positive growth through recruitment, reinstatements and retention of members

The goals make our SHINE!

It's been an honor to support my Arizona $A\Delta K$ chapters by serving as State President.

Arizona has nineteen active chapters with terrific chapter leaders. Chapter minutes were read and reflected on, yearbooks were collected and chapter events were attended in person. I focused on the installation of officers, anniversary celebrations, initiation of new members. I visited chapter meetings and greeted sisters on Founders' Day celebrations.

The executive board voted to dissolve Colorado River District. Fidelis Zeta is now part of Central District. A request to change Alpha Alpha chapter from the Central district was approved and they joined the Northern District. There are three districts, Northern, Southern and Central.

Regrettably, two chapters disbanded this past year. Alpha Kappa (Yuma) and Gamma (North Phx) surrendered their charters.

At the State level, I conducted executive board meetings, planned and executed AZ Leadership meetings and hosted social events. I also attended Southwest Leadership meetings, international events on Zoom as well as attending the SW Regional Conference in Hawaii and the International

Convention in Kansas City. At Founder's Days and Leadership Workshops, Chapter Presidents and chapter achievements were celebrated.

To support the AZ Scholarship Fund, the selected state Altruistic project, Honor An AZ Sister program was created. Sisters donated \$1,295 to our Scholarship fund in honor of members. Thank you for your gifts! Friendship bracelets and raffle baskets were sold at Founders' Days events and the international convention to also support our scholarship fund.

The Executive and expanded board members donated PJ's to Helping Hands Foster Care in Phoenix, water bottles to the Food Bank in Casa Grande and school supplies to a Title I school in Tucson. For the State Convention altruistic project, donations were collected for the St Mary's Food Bank.

Communication about events was effective with Corresponding Secretary Mary Peoples who sent information to chapter presidents and/or every member with an active email address.

The Sunshine Times newsletter was distributed four times each year and the awesome editor

Brenda McDowell and her committee edited every page. The Leadership message, World Understanding, Fraternity Education activities, Chapter Sightings, Honor an AZ Sister honorees and donors, Workshop information, State Convention information articles were scripted for the Sunshine Times newsletter.

My recommendations is to change the procedures of the AZ Convention to a one-day meeting without the need of hotel facilities and meals. Meals costs, hotels fees and tech services have become very costly. Chapter leaders and members will attend Leadership workshops and Founders' Day events, however they will opt out of the convention because of the costs or travel involved.

I recommend enhancing communications with chapter leaders with a ZOOM scheduled meeting.

Those serving on the Expanded board have been vital to the operations of the state procedures, however, there are too many committee chairs. I recommend eliminating the non-essential ones.

More Convention Speakers:

Kristi invited **Adriel Grieshaber** and **Amber Brink** from the Dysart Unified School District to inform members about The Science of Reading. It is an approach to teaching reading based on research and not a program. An Arizona bill signed in April 2022 requires all K-5 teachers to take a professional learning course in Science of Reading.

K-5 Literacy Endorsement:

All new graduates must have the endorsement by 2025 and current teachers must have the endorsement by 2028.

The Science of Reading

There are so many pieces to the Science of Reading that it can be difficult to know where to start. Here are a few highlights about what the Science of Reading IS and what it IS NOT. This knowledge will help you on your journey to teaching all children, including those with diverse needs and cultural backgrounds, to read.



A Collection of Research

Research, over time, from multiple fields of study using methods that confirm and disconfirm theories on how children best learn to read.



Teaching Based on the 5 Big Ideas

Phonemic Awareness - The ability to identify and play with individual sounds in spoken words.

Phonics - Reading instruction on understanding how letters and groups of letters link to sounds to form lettersound relationships and spelling natterns

Fluency - The ability to read words, phrases, sentences, and stories correctly, with enough speed, and expression.


Vocabulary - Knowing what words mean and how to say and use them correctly.

What it IS NOT

A program, an intervention, or a product that you can buy.

The Science of Reading could be considered an approach to teaching reading that is based on decades of research and evidence. It is NOT a specific program.



Phonics-based programs that drill phonics skills.

Phonics is an integral part of teaching reading based on science, but it is just one of the five big ideas that should be taught so all children can learn to read.



Complete and no more study needs to be done.

As with any science, it is never complete. We can always know more. More study happens all the time and researchers, teachers, and families can work together to bring the best research into classrooms.



The Arizona Alpha Delta Kappa Scholarship Committee has had a busy biennium. This is our final report for the 2022-2024 biennium. It has been an honor to serve with Kristi Koziol, State President.

- A \$1,000.00 scholarship was given to Northern Arizona University Flagstaff to Andrew Oxley and to Northern Arizona University Yuma to Jezavel Reyes.
- A \$1,000 scholarship was given to the University of Arizona Collegiate Club. Megan Denise Floyd was the recipient.
- A \$1,000.00 scholarship was given to Arizona State University, Mary Lou Fulton Teachers College. The recipient was Emily Mohert.
- The Arizona Mini- Scholarship is given in the Fall and Spring of each year in the biennium. Up to \$250 can be requested to attend non-Alpha Delta Kappa educational events. The Mini-Scholarship was awarded in the fall of 2022 to Sandra McAlpin for \$150 and in the spring of 2023, it was awarded to Carol Phillips for \$120. Both sisters were from Gamma chapter and used to attend art seminars.
- The Arizona Mini- Scholarship was not awarded in the fall of 2023 nor in the spring of 2024. No applications were submitted.


Congratulations Arizona!

Partial eclipse brings total excitement to SUSD teacher, students

The upcoming eclipse on April 8 won't completely hit Southern Arizona, but that hasn't stymied the excitement for Sahuarita school kids—or sixth-grade science teacher Michelle Roosma.

Roosma, who teaches at Wrightson Ridge, said the school is setting up two solar telescopes on the basketball courts, where students will have a chance to directly view the eclipse. She said the school also has eclipse glasses for students to cycle through during different stages of the eclipse and draw their observations.

Roosma said one telescope was provided by volunteer John Meschberger with Space Science Adventure. It will connect to a screen display so groups of students can observe the live eclipse together.



The eclipse over Green Valley and Sahuarita at 10:40 a.m. in August 2017, near the height of the event.

While Sahuarita isn't in the path of totality, the event's timing still turned out well for Roosma and her lesson plans. "Because we have been studying, right now, with our state standards, we finished with constellations, phases of the moon, and the Solar System," she said. "So, this is perfectly timed with our state standards right now."

Even though they will only see 60-65% coverage that appears, it isn't anything to shake a stick at for Roosma, her students and adults in general. "They're very excited," she said about her students. "It doesn't happen very often and when you're little, it's a big deal. Even if you're big it's a big deal."


