
Southern District Founders' Day Celebration Tucson, AZ

- The silver star signifies the Silver Sisters of 25 years.
- The blue star signifies the Sapphire Sisters of 35 years.
- The gold star represents our Golden Sisters who celebrate 50 years of membership .
- The diamond star represents our Diamond Sisters who celebrate 60 years of sisterhood.
- At the base you see the telescope watching over the earth which represents our International Headquarters, an integral key to the operation of this sorority and its 29,000 members.

Meet our Scholarship Winners!

Summer Greetings! Your scholarship committee has already begun their duties!

Scholarships are awarded each biennium to the four state universities. The first year of the biennium has been awarded to Northern Arizona University (NAU) in Flagstaff and to NAU in Yuma. The award is \$1,000 at each university. Identification of the students is made by each university's scholarship office on the basis of their own criteria.

The Alpha Delta Kappa State Future Educator Scholarship recipients at NAU Flagstaff were selected in May 2018. They are Madison (Maddi) Roberts and Amberly Ruiz. They are both seniors and will be completing their student teaching this school year. They each received \$475.00.

Maddi Roberts will be completing her studies at NAU in December and plans to student teach in her hometown of Orange, CA in January 2019. She plans to move permanently to California to teach Special Education in an elementary setting. She is grateful for the scholarship since she has struggled financially throughout college, causing her much stress. Maddi has completed over 100 hours in clinical partnerships with Knoles Elementary and Flagstaff High School. She thanks Alpha Delta

Kappa for "helping me in my road to success in a career in education and to be believed in and supported in this way, I am grateful beyond words."

Amberly Ruiz (at right) is honored to be a recipient. She grew up in an immigrant family with parents who fled their native country to seek freedom in the U.S. She has been able to work with students of many diverse backgrounds by teaching children on the Navajo Reservation, teaching students with English as a Second Language, and working with students from affluent families. These opportunities "have strengthened my skills and I am looking forward to building on those skills during my student teaching this Fall." She hopes to become a math educator.

The Arizona State Mini Scholarship deadline for activities taking place between November 15, 2018 and May 15, 2019 is October 15, 2018. The application is found on the Arizona State website or with your chapter

president in her state president's packet. Applications are to be sent to the State Scholarship Chairman.

The FES award will be coming in the spring of 2019. This scholarship is for a relative or ward of an active Alpha Delta Kappa member who wishes to attend a full-time university, college, or post-secondary school. A grade point average of 3.0 or better is required. This is an annual scholarship of \$500.00. The application should be mailed to the State Scholarship Chairman, postmarked no later than March 1, 2019. The application is found on the arizonaalphadeltakappa.com website or with your chapter president in her state president's packet.




