





# Saturday Morning in Austin by Michelle Roosma

The morning session began with a review of the various generations within our organization, introducing the concept of "membershift"—the idea that organizations must change to continue growing. New Collegiate Clubs have formed in Kansas, Arkansas, and Kentucky, along with a brand new chapter, Gamma Epsilon, in Alabama. Of the 953 new members joining Alpha Delta Kappa, 656 (or two-thirds) are current educators—excellent news for our organization.


#### Motivational Speakers: From the Gym to the Mind Gym

Our morning motivational speakers were Langston Moore and Preston Thorne, both former NFL football players who transitioned into education. They tell their students they moved from the gym to the mind gym, where we work our brain muscle, emphasizing that skills pay the bills.

Their teaching philosophy centers on **E.A.T.**:

- **E** = Effort towards learning new things (all effort ain't good effort)
- **A** = Attitude towards change
- **T** = Time it takes to become good at something


This framework applies not only to students but also to educators, both retired and working.



#### **Embracing Technology and Innovation**

The speakers introduced AI as something new—much like Facebook once was. They emphasized that AI won't replace educators but can be used to help both students and teachers when applied appropriately.

Moore and Thorne have written a book called #JustaChicken, which sold out on site. I particularly appreciated their message about going pro in reading and writing, and their reminder that, as educators, our trophies are walking around in the world instead of sitting on a shelf.



## **Final Thoughts**

Both men were engaging and inspirational—exactly what we needed for our FF (fanny fatigue), another new term we learned at International Convention. Their presentation perfectly captured the spirit of continuous learning and adaptation that defines our profession.

This was followed by an engaging and hilarious 15-minute set by Nancy Burkett (DE VPM)—teacher, motivational speaker, and stand-up comic—who had the audience laughing out loud. She concluded her performance with her original and relatable "The Teacher Song."

The session continued with a panel featuring five teachers who shared firsthand experiences with different branches of the AΔK Foundation. Michelle Roosma (AZ Psi) spoke first and beautifully about the Leadership Academy. Other panelists included Melanie Kelly (WY Gamma) on Excellence in Education, Mandy Tribe (VA Alpha Lambda) on Scholarships and Grants, Caroline Gilmore (FL Alpha) on the Disaster Relief Program, and Sara Kelly (MA Mu) on the ITE Program. Mollie Acosta (CA Xi) and Ellen Roderick (MD Beta) moderated the informative discussion.



Sara Wills Carlsson (SC Alpha) then delivered a compelling talk titled "Navigating Our World of Differences," urging educators to approach cultural differences in the classroom with curiosity, compassion and courage rather than judgment. She emphasized the importance of respecting students' customs and creating an



inclusive environment.

Amount Awarded: \$400 per grant; up to forty-nine grants available

**Deadline:** October 1 (Application available at <u>AΔK website/Foundation/</u> Grants and Scholarships/Classroom Grant.)

The **Alpha Delta Kappa (A\DeltaK) Regional Mini Scholarship** is designed to provide funds for attendance in the fall or spring at non-A $\Delta$ K sponsored events (e.g., conferences, conventions, seminars, workshops and non-degree classes). Graduate and doctoral studies are not included. The goals are to promote continuing professional development, provide personal and professional enrichment opportunities and encourage commitment to educational excellence.

Available to: Members

**Amount** Awarded: Up to \$500 per scholarship, maximum \$10,500 annually. Scholarships are divided equally amongst regions as possible.

#### **Deadlines:**

Regional Mini-Fall <u>October 15</u> (activities that take place January 1-May 31) Regional Mini-Spring <u>April 15</u> (activities that take place June 1-December 31)





### Arizona Mu Sister is Honored

Stacey Rosenfeld, Arizona Mu sister who teaches science at Desert Mountain High School, has been honored with the Helios Award. This is a unique award since the teacher does not apply for it. There were fewer than 15 teachers honored this year. The Helios Foundation and Arizona State University spotlight educators whose influence last well beyond high school in a program called the ASU Impact Corps. The Helios Decision Center tracks how students perform in community colleges and public universities, and then looks back to the high school teacher who taught them. Teachers nominated this year participate in a Cohort for STEM. Stacey will be featured in the Arizona State University Magazine and was featured on ABC 15 in Phoenix.

You will be pleased to notice there is more flexibility for chapters. Please upload a copy of the bylaws to your computer. You will find it beneficial to have these readily available.

#### Here are a few of the updates:

- Types of membership status has been streamlined, and "Active on Leave" has been retired.
- **ARTICLE VII**, Section 3, page 11 states: "Each chapter of Alpha Delta Kappa shall at all times have a president, secretary and treasurer. The officers may include, but not limited to, president-elect and/or vice-president, immediate past president, corresponding secretary, historian, chaplain and sergeant-at-arms."
- **ARTICLE VIII**, Section 3b, page 13 states: "The chapter may establish the following as standing or additional special committees: altruistic, budget, bylaws, fraternity education, membership and nominating."
- **ARTICLE XVI**, Section 2a, page 16 states: "Chapters may hold at least nine(9) meetings during the year." Chapters should strive to hold nine (9) meetings but nine are not required if circumstances make it impossible to do so.



## 2025-2027 WORLD UNDERSTANDING PROJECT

At the International Convention the announcement was made that the World Understanding Project for this biennium (2025-27) has been canceled.

Travel bans to all nominated countries (Mexico, South Sudan and Sierra Leone) made implementation impossible. New projects will be accepted in 2026.


