From the Composer's Desk

If you love listening to music, you're in good company. Charles Darwin once remarked, "If I had my life to live over again, I would have made a rule to read some poetry and listen to some music at least once every week." Jimi Hendrix called music his "religion."

Music fills our lives and elicits many emotions, but how does music benefit us? In 2001, a neurologist, Maruc Raichle discovered music benefits individuals by allowing minds to go into a wandering mode. Raichle reported: "Music is one of the most effective ways of allowing you to enter this wandering mode. Music fuels the mind and thus it fuels creativity. A creative mind allows a person to make great discoveries and innovations."

Music helps in the classroom to make learning fun and memorable. Teachers use tunes for helping students learn parts of speech, multiplication tables and even the states and capitals! Evidence led researchers to study about the impact of music on people who suffer memory loss.

Research shows listening to music calms people down even during highly stressful and painful events. Think of William Congreve's well-known quote of 1697, "Music has charms to soothe a savage breast."

According to Harvard Health Publishing from Harvard Medical School, a 2006 study of 60 adults with chronic pain found that music was able to reduce pain, depression, and disability. Slow or meditative music produced a relaxing effect; faster tempos produced arousal, but immediately after the upbeat music stopped, the subjects' heart rates and blood pressures came down to below their usual levels, indicating relaxation. So if you need to relax, simply listen to Mozart or classical music, close your eyes and UNWIND!

Music is a universal language in which musicians claim to communicate across cultural and linguistic boundaries in ways you cannot do with ordinary languages. Look at all of the Karaoke places found around the world! Music brings people together – singing and even swaying back and forth at concerts or events! What a Wonderful World – music bringing people together!

Iota's Banner depicts the Casa Grande Monument, for which our town is named. It is an ancient, Native American dwelling, near Casa Grande. It was built in multiple stories and housed numerous families, which was unique for its time.

Psi's Banner was designed by Marci Gillooly in 1992. The following chapter members participated in the construction of the banner: Marci Gillooly, Lauri Harmon and Gloria Suarez.

Psi's banner is depicted by the central figure of a woman looking down at a child and holding the world in her hand. The child is looking up at the woman with an outreached hand. The



woman's hand symbolizes a mother handing the world to her baby, much the way a teacher hands the world to her students. Stars surround them with the star of scholarship, star of education, star of goodwill and star of sisterhood. In September, 2016, the words, "World Understanding" were added on the arm of the woman holding the world.

Phi's Banner was designed by Denise Richards, Doris Naegle, and Darlene Arnold. They sought to include the mountains around Bisbee, Ramsey Canyon hummingbirds, and St. David's lake. The embroidery was done by Darlene Arnold and the painting and the fringe by Doris Naegle and Denise Richards.


Northern District




Flagstaff Unified School District Legendary Teacher of the Year!



Arizona Chapter Expansion Update-Show Low Area

On November 3, 2018, six Arizona AΔK sisters: Twyla Preising, Nancy Martinez, Betty Jo Evers, Nancy Harrison, Barbara Sundust and Betty Ehret travelled to meet with prospective teacher candidates at the White Mountain Nature Center in Lakeside, AZ, With disappointment, only two individuals arrived, both county administrators from Apache and Navajo Counties. However, the group discussed and brainstormed reasons and alternatives for low teacher turnout and came up with a plan. The County Superintendents will send out a Survey Monkey to qualified teachers the first week in J anuary to determine interest and positive responses. The County Superintendents will send the results to the Executive Board for the January 12, 2019, meeting to make the final decision to possibly return on February 23, 2019, or wait until a later time. The board and Zeta Chapter – who agreed to sponsor the new chapter are hopeful.

WORLD UNDERSTANDING

A few years ago, while in Morocco I dined with a Moroccan family in their home. This young couple had two small children. The man farmed with his father but lived in the city, Fez. Their kitchen was very small and our hostess only had a stove top to cook and no oven. She cooked in a clay cone shaped dish called a tagine which cooks food at a low temperature for hours, a common way to cook in Morocco. For dinner we sat on big cushions on the floor around a big round table with the tagine in the center and served ourselves.

The following is the recipe she used to make our meal: chicken, cut up in pieces, one onion, 2 cloves of garlic, 2 large carrots, 2 large potatoes and 2 yellow squash, chopped. She placed the chicken in a large bowl and sprinkled ½ tsp. cumin, ¼ tsp. cinnamon, ½ tsp. each of pepper and turmeric and 1 tsp. salt over it and tossed until meat was covered. The onions went on the bottom with a little olive oil, then chicken and vegetables into the tagine and cooked until tender about 4-5 hours. It was delicious and we dipped bread in the juices from cooking the dish. Since then, I have made this in my slow cooker and it worked fine and tasted great.

WOMAN OF DISTINCTION

Jan Karp, AZ State Woman of Distinction Chair

2020 Woman of Distinction Award

According to the Policies and Procedures, each chapter may submit in writing ONLY <u>one</u> candidate for State Woman of Distinction. The chapter should feel that this candidate has made an outstanding contribution in their local community or a neighboring community to the fields of education, humanities, sciences or arts. The candidate should exhibit volunteerism, inspire teamwork, possess strong



beliefs, values, ethics, character, knowledge and skills, be inspirational, selfless, and trusted. The 12 steps involved in selecting the Woman of Distinction include:

- 1. The Woman of Distinction Chairman shall select three Committee members.
- 2. The Woman of Distinction Chair sends information and application forms to chapters in **August** of **odd** number years.
- 3. The Chairman shall acknowledge receipt of applications, which shall be received by **December 1** of the **odd** numbered years.
- 4. The Chairman shall verify that the candidates have never been active members of Alpha Delta Kappa. In addition, the candidates cannot be presently under contract with a school system at the time of her election nor engaged as a professional educator.
- 5. In January of the even numbered years, the Committee shall meet to review the applications.
- 6. By **February 15** of the **even** numbered years, the Committee shall select no more than **three** candidates to be presented to the membership and one shall be elected at the State Convention.
- 7. The Chairman sends a letter to the chapter presidents whose candidates were not selected as final candidates.
- 8. A biographical sketch of each candidate shall be prepared by the Committee.
- 9. The names and biographical sketches of the candidates shall be printed in the State Newsletter 30-90 days prior to the State Convention (deadline February 20, 2020).
- 10. The Chairman shall present the names of the candidates and a brief summary about each to the Convention body during the business session of the State Convention.
- 11. The Chairman shall present the winner with a letter and a plaque, not to exceed \$25, to be paid for from the State Treasury.
- 12. The Committee shall evaluate the application process, including the applications.


